

# The RCMP Phased Interview Model For Suspects



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## Rationale for Transformation

- Renewed attacks against the 'Reid Model':
  - R vs. Chapple (ABPC 2012).
  - R vs. Armishaw (ONSC 2011).
- Academics/media focused on the 'perils' of Reid influenced / guilt presumptive models of interviewing.
- Concerns with false confessions, unreliable, and involuntary statements.
- Desire/pressure to push the 'PEACE' nonaccusatory model of interviewing, despite a lack of full understanding of the model and its limitations (no persuasion).

- In 2012, members of the RCMP spent a month with the London Metropolitan Police to examine the Tier 3 PEACE model (suspects):
  - Received training (3 weeks)
  - Met with:
    - Trainers
    - Practioners
    - Academics
    - Crown
    - Defence Lawyers




- A national RCMP focus group consisting of the following SME's was struck to objectively examine the force's approach to suspect interviews:
  - Interview team specialists
  - Polygraph examiners
  - Trainers (PRTC and CPC)
  - Learning and development



- The group conducted extensive review of leading Canadian and international research into suspect interviews. Including the work of:
  - Richard Leo
  - Saul Kassin
  - Ron Fischer
  - Chris Meissner (HIG)
  - Snook & Eastwood
  - Par Anders Granhag
  - Ray Bull
  - Becky Milne
  - Eric Sheppard



- The group examined the existing suspect interview model - the RCMP Structured Interrogation Model.
- Reviewed Reid's and PEACE.
- Considered through the filter of leading Canadian case-law decisions (voluntariness), notably:
  - R vs. Oickle, R vs. Singh and R vs. Sinclair (the 'interrogation trilogy').





#### FINDINGS - PEACE MODEL

#### PROS:

- Non-Guilt Presumptive
- Not concerned with obtaining a confession – only information
- Well suited for voluntariness
- Objective veracity testing
- Scientifically validated

#### **CONS:**

- The adverse inference
- Impermissible inducements (the 'Al threat')
- No persuasion
- Dependent on engaged suspect



#### FINDINGS - REID TECHNIQUE

#### PROS:

 Effective persuasion (theme based approach – moral inducements)




#### **CONS:**

- Guilt presumptive
- Subjective veracity testing (BAI)
- Stopping denials
- Maximization techniques
- Pragmatic implication
- Not in-line with the confessions rule
- Increased risk of false confessions
- Not scientifically validated

- Over a 2.5 year period, the focus group considered the advantages of both PEACE and Reid's and concluded that:
  - Foundationally non-accusatory interviewing should form the central approach to suspect interviews (heavily PEACE influenced).
  - Persuasion and accusatory practises as supported under Canadian law were still relevant but only in specific contexts (lightly Reid's influenced).
  - Objective veracity testing over subjective veracity testing (no BAI).



#### The RCMP Phased Interview Model



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- Following adoption of 'PIM' in Dec, 2014, a training platform was developed through the assistance of curriculum designers in Ottawa.
- Starting in the Spring of 2015, pilot training courses were run through PRTC while the CTS was finalized.
- In late 2016 the CTS and course content were finalized.
- The course is now delivered across the country with 17 courses having been delivered in BC.
- Online components through IDP used as pre-requisite requirements.



#### Success with the Phased Interview Model

- The RCMP Phased Suspect Model has proven to be highly effective at gathering complete, accurate, reliable & voluntary information in, but not limited to:
  - Homicides including stranger on stranger homicides and serial homicides.
  - Organized crime investigations.
  - National Security investigations (HUMINT interviews).
  - Sexual crimes.
- Research project to examine the model currently being developed with BC academics Barry Cooper and Michael Woodworth.
